


Sunday Worship for 28th June Third Sunday after Trinity

Service leader's intro from Cheryl Moore

Good morning everyone! and welcome to today's virtual service, the last in this month's theme of Women in the Bible. All four women – Deborah, Martha, Hannah and Lydia were examples of people with great faith and each one has given us different meaningful messages on which to reflect – Deborah the only female prophet and judge mentioned in the Bible tells us that God can

accomplish great things through people who are willing to be lead by Him. Hannah, mother of Samuel, also from the OT, showed that it is alright to pray to God for a personal miracle if the outcome of this request is ultimately for God's glory. Martha, sister to Mary and Lazarus is an example of one type of personality in contrast to her sister. Both women had a great love for Christ but it manifested itself in different ways because of their different personalities. The message for us being that of finding a balance, between worshipping Christ and service. Andrew is giving the talk today about Lydia – a successful Greek business woman, dealer in expensive purple cloth, known for her hospitality and the first Greek to be baptized by Paul. We look forward to hearing her story.

Readings Acts 16: 11-15

¹¹ From Troas we put out to sea and sailed straight for Samothrace, and the next day we went on to Neapolis. ¹² From there we travelled to Philippi, a Roman colony and the leading city of that district of Macedonia. And we stayed there several days.

¹³ On the Sabbath we went outside the city gate to the river, where we expected to find a place of prayer. We sat down and began to speak to the women who had gathered there. ¹⁴ One of those listening was a woman from the city of Thyatira named Lydia, a dealer in purple cloth. She was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to respond to Paul's message. ¹⁵ When she and the members of her household were baptized, she invited us to her home. "If you consider me a believer in the Lord," she said, "come and stay at my house." And she persuaded us.

Talk (by Andrew Killick)



Good morning. This is an odd way to give a talk! But we have had to get used to a lot of strange things during this period of lockdown, so I hope that you will profit from reading on! This is a series on "Women of God". Lydia is an important woman of God, the first convert to Christianity in Europe – but let's go back earlier in the story and look at the Who, When, Where, Why, What and How. You might like to keep Acts chapter 16 open for reference, along with a map of the eastern end of the Mediterranean if you have maps in the back of the Bible.

Who was Lydia? Her name literally means "the Lydian woman", a simple name indicating that she MIGHT have been born a slave. But if so, she had gained her freedom and prospered as a seller of purple cloth in Thyatira (in the Roman province of Asia, now part of Turkey; and it's one of the 7 Churches of Asia to whom letters are addressed in Revelation chapters 2 and 3). By the time we reach Acts chapter 16 she had moved a long way across the Aegean Sea to Philippi, an important centre for trade in Macedonia to the north of Greece.



When did these events take place? Paul was on what we now call his second missionary journey. We do not have many precise dates for the events of the New Testament; but we are in the period around 50 AD. We can be very certain of this thanks to Acts 18.12 which refers to Gallio as the Roman proconsul. He held office in Corinth in 52 AD. After leaving Philippi Paul had spent a short time in Thessalonica, Berea and Athens before working in Corinth for 18 months; then he was seized and accused before Gallio. Gallio, by the way, was the brother of the philosopher Seneca who was tutor to the emperor Nero – but that's a completely different story!

Where is Philippi? Philippi was a Roman colony in Macedonia, which was formerly the kingdom of Philip and his son Alexander the Great, but today is part of northern Greece. Roman soldiers had been settled there after the battle of Philippi in 42 BC (where the murderers of Julius Caesar met their end), and it had risen to be the leading city of that area (see verse 12). It was on an important east-west trade route, which presumably explains why Lydia had chosen to come there and carry on her trading.

Why did Paul come to Philippi? Paul must have realised the strategic importance of Philippi. If a church could be planted there, the Gospel would be able to spread through the surrounding area. [Memo to today's church: be strategic in our thinking!] But in fact it was all part of God's plan, guiding Paul and his party NOT to enter the province of Asia, NOT to enter Bithynia, but then sending a vision when they reached the port of Troas guiding them to go west to Macedonia (see verses 6-10). [This is a good illustration of how the Lord guides us: sometimes direct prompts from dreams, visions or advice from friends which we are confident come from God, combining with our own God-given wisdom to make sensible choices. I like that verse Psalm 25.12: in the RSV translation it says "Who is the man that fears the Lord? Him will he instruct in the way that he should choose". So WE do the choosing and GOD does the guiding: both elements are important, and in general we shouldn't just sit around doing nothing while waiting for some mythical bolt from the blue!]

What happened? Chapter 16 focuses on encounters with three people: Lydia, a slave girl and the town jailer. Paul usually visited the synagogue and spoke to the Jews when he arrived in a new place. But there was no synagogue in Philippi, presumably because there were not the requisite ten men needed as a minimum. So Paul went down to the river on the Sabbath, expecting that there would be a place of prayer there. He met several women, including Lydia. Interestingly she was already a worshipper of God – how often we meet people like that in the pages of Acts, like the Roman centurion Cornelius in chapter 10, people who don't

yet understand the Gospel but are ready to receive it when it is explained to them fully for the first time. [Memo: We live in an age of increasing Biblical and spiritual illiteracy; but we should keep a sharp lookout for people who are already well disposed towards spiritual things and in whom God is already at work!] Lydia responded to Paul's message and was baptised along with the rest of her household. And that raises a question: was she perhaps a widow? Or was she an unmarried businesswoman carrying on a successful trade with folk working for her? We don't know; but she certainly was a natural leader and insisted on Paul and his party staying in her house: verse 15 suggests that she wouldn't take no for an answer!

However, the most important result of this riverside meeting was the planting of a church in Philippi. It survived the attacks that were made on Paul later in chapter 16; Paul was arrested, beaten and imprisoned, he was miraculously delivered and he was able to give some parting encouragement to Lydia and the group of believers before he moved on to Thessalonica (verse 40). Later, on his third missionary journey, Paul visited the young churches in Macedonia twice – on his way southward to Corinth and then on his return journey (Acts 19.21 and 20.1-3) – and later still he sent the letter we now call Philippians, when he was a prisoner in Rome sometime around 63 AD. [Memo: Evangelism is very important, but so is follow-up. We need to tell people the Good News, and if they receive it, we need to stay alongside them and teach and help them.]

How did all this come about? The short answer is that it was the Lord's work. The whole of the book of Acts is a missionary book – God's mission. We see God at work at Pentecost, when 3,000 people joined the church; at the Temple, where Peter and John were given the authority to heal a lame man; on a desert road, where Philip led an important Ethiopian official to faith in Jesus; in the conversion of Saul on the road to Damascus; in Caesarea, where Cornelius the Roman centurion welcomed Peter and accepted the Gospel message; in miraculous deliverances from prison – Peter in chapter 12 and Paul in chapter 16; in God's miraculous preservation of Paul on three long journeys round the Mediterranean world where he met violent opposition, arrests, beatings, imprisonment, stoning... All this would have been totally impossible unless it was the work of God.

But the human agents are vital too! There is a simple but profound saying "God has no hands and feet in this world except ours". We are important to God's mission! Another old chorus goes:

"Mine are the hands to do the work; My feet shall run for thee; My lips shall spread the glorious news; Lord, here am I: send me."

As we study the story of Paul's meeting with Lydia and everything that resulted from it, we can marvel that each of them was the right person in the right place at the right time with the right attitude. They didn't need to fret – "Oh dear, I wonder what God wants me to do today – I'm bound to be in the wrong place!" They just needed to walk with the Lord moment by moment, enjoying his unseen presence and allowing him to use them as he chose. And so should we!

Affirmation of Faith
